BASCA Thank You


I wanted to take a moment to express my heartfelt gratitude for all of your support during the BASCA 5K! Your dedication and hard work truly made a difference in the success of the event.

Brooks Clubhouse is the only ABI (Acquired Brain Injury) Clubhouse in Florida. Brooks Clubhouse fees are based on a sliding scale, with most members qualifying for the minimum daily rate of \$12.00. Last year our Club donation purchased a recumbent stationary bike, which is used daily by many of the program members. This year's donation will go towards the purchase of chairs. Currently chairs must be moved multiple times during the day based upon the scheduled activities.

Blanket of Red Flowers, 1979

Nylon plain weave, printed cotton plain weave, synthetic velvet; quilted

This quilt was banned in Boston. Agusta Agustsson hung it in the main gallery of City Hall the day before the opening of an exhibition of work by women artists called **Silver Threads and Golden Needles**. Mayor Kevin H. White's Cultural Council, which sponsored the exhibition, informed Agustsson to remove it from the show. Instead, the quilt was exhibited in the studio of Massachusetts College of Art and Design faculty member Rob Moore and also informally by one of the other members of the Silver Threads and Golden Needles group. Some feminists objected to the male genitalia, while political and environmental activists thought that its sexual subject matter was too frivolous. Trained as a printmaker at MassArt, Agustsson continues to create and exhibit both quilts and works on paper. More than forty years after its removal from Boston's City Hall, this quilt with its repeated blocks of male and female genitalia rendered in colorful textiles still gives many viewers pause.


Bisa Butler's Artist Statement


The source photo for this quilt features 10 African American men and one little boy; most of them wearing baseball uniforms with Morris Brown going across their chests. The photo is significant to me for many reasons; the first being the date of 1899. For me to see young Black college educated men during that time is a rarity, and even more so to be pictured playing collegiate sports. Morris Brown College was founded in 1881 and is the first educational institution in Georgia to be owned and operated entirely by African Americans. These young scholars lived in a very dangerous time to be Black; only 37 years had passed since slavery was abolished and there were many violent backlashes by Whites who feared this new formerly enslaved workforce would steal their jobs. Race riots as they were called but in actuality massacres of Blacks occurred in many locations including Wilmington N.C in 1898, the Atlanta riots of 1906, the riots of East St. Louis in 1917, the Red Summer

In the midst of prejudice, discrimination and violence the human condition and will to live perseveres. These young scholar/athletes were the best and the brightest in their city, towns and households. It was a privilege for any person to go to college

- and especially for a Black person at that time. The baseball players are symbols of African American success yet I also want to acknowledge their individuality. I studied the photo to try and determine which one was a leader, who was the class clown, and who was the laid back peacekeeper. Fierce crimson indicates that a young man is a powerful leader and the captain of the team. A player who depicted in shades of blue and aqua is seen indolently leaning, seemingly without a care in the world. The players who appeared a little younger than their teammates are depicted in shades of yellow to represent high energy and youth.

These young men captured at the beginning of their lives and frozen in time by the photographer's lens remain the sentinels for Truth. They represent who we are as a people, as human beings. In it you will see determination, dedication, excellence, resistance, intelligence but also innocence, gentleness, and love or in other words. God and Truth.
